


### Come Before Winter

Paul admonished Timothy to come before winter because travel would be difficult then.



For some reason Paul did not want to wait the months until spring came again to see Timothy's face, hear his words of encouragement, see how he had grown in Christ, and feel himself strengthened by his son in the faith. His plea was urgent.

Paul asked Timothy to come before winter, perhaps because of the cloak that he needed to endure the cold. Paul was incarcerated in the Mamertine Prison. He had been imprisoned in a different place earlier and had been allowed to have friends and visitors as much as he wanted. This time was different. Many had become ashamed of Paul because of his imprisonment. The government had locked him up on false charges. The Roman authorities had called the Christians an occult that drank human blood and was trying to overthrow the government. One writer who had apparently visited the prison, said, "Before you enter the prison, there is a long list of Christian martyrs who died in the prison. When we walked down into the dungeon, the rats scurried. Although it was mid-summer, it was dark and damp. Paul asked Timothy to come quickly. And now I know why he asked for the cloak; Paul was always cold and he was old. He could never get warm, not because it was so cold, but because he could never dry out." Paul asked Timothy to come before winter because so many had forsaken him. Even old soldiers need human comfort. Paul had the presence

of Christ with him in the dungeon, which was far more than any human could offer. But the Lord knows that we, as humans, need human comfort! Notice some of the things that were against Paul even though he didn't tell us about the rats scurrying around, the dripping water, and the stench of human waste that permeated the prison. He didn't act like he was living in misery. Listen to him again: second Timothy 4:6, For I am now ready to be offered, and the time of my departure is at hand.

10 For Demas hath forsaken me, having loved this present world, and is departed unto Thessalonica; Crescens to Galatia, Titus unto Dalmatia

11 Only Luke is with me. Take Mark, and bring him with thee: for he is profitable to me for the ministry.

12 And Tychicus have I sent to Ephesus

13 The cloke that I left at Troas with Carpus, when thou comest, bring with thee, and the books, but especially the parchments..

14 Alexander the coppersmith did me much evil: the Lord reward him according to his works:

15 Of whom be thou ware also; for he hath greatly withstood our words

16 At my first answer no man stood with me, but all men forsook me: I pray God that it may not be laid to their charge.

20 Erastus abode at Corinth: but Trophimus have I left at Miletum sick.

21 Do thy diligence to come before winter.

There maybe a discouraged friend, brother, or sister who needs you now. Perhaps you have been thinking of them and their plight, their battle, and all that the devil and the world have thrown at them.

As I write these words today, I have to wonder if the Lord is talking to you. Is there someone you know who is yearning for the comfort of human fellowship in the storm and solitude of service, one of your loved ones, or a friend who is battling discouragement and disappointment? Is their heart cry today, "Come before winter?"

The Rev. Dr. Clarence Eugene White of Temperance, Michigan, left this earthly life peaceful-

ly for his Heavenly Home, Saturday, September 15, 2018, 87 years of age. Rev. White loved and served His Lord and Savior for over 60 years. Born in Princeton, West Virginia, on October 12, 1934, he graduated from Princeton High School



in 1948 and then joined the U. S. Navy, serving during the Korean war, 1948-1952. He was 3rd Class Interior Communications Officer, Master of Arms, and Police Officer at Sea. Upon his return he met the love of his life, Evelyn Louise Barrett, and they were married June 1, 1953. They celebrated their 65th anniversary this year.

Rev. White served as a pastor for the former Pilgrim Holiness Church where he was ordained in 1963, and served in pastorates in West Virginia, New York, Kentucky, and Michigan. He most recently pastored Bible Fellowship Church in Monroe, MI, for a total of 25 years. He received his education from Frankfort Pilgrim College, Frankfort, Ind, Bachelor of Theology and Doctorate of Divinity from Fundamental Bible Seminary, Thornton, CO, and Master of Ministry from Bethany Theological Seminary, Dothan, AL. He also received a Honorary Doctor of Divinity from Emmanuel Theological Seminary, Rossville, GA. While in WV he was the Assistant District Superintendent of the Wesleyan Church. He was also President of Maybee Camp, Maybee, MI.

He is survived by his wife, Louise White; sons, Steven and Jonathan White; daughter, Sharon Beckhoff, five grandchildren and many other loving family members and countless friends.

Funeral service was at Rupp funeral home, Monroe, MI. Burial was at Rose lawn Memorial Park with military honors provided by VFW Monroe Post 1138.

On January 19, 1945, in Galena Park, Texas, a suburb of Houston, a baby boy came into the world. Orba Jefferson Perry, later nicknamed Buddy, was not born into a home of wealth or fame. His birth was not heralded on the front pages of newspapers like the world news. But the God who rules the orbits of planets and designed the constellations of stars had His hand on this little boy from Houston.

At the age of 17 he accepted the call to preach. In 1962 he moved to Oklahoma to attend Bethany Nazarene College, where he spent two years in Bible college preparing for the ministry. It was there that a sweet young lady named Jane Staley caught his eye and they began dating. Buddy married Jane on June 12, 1964. After two years of college they moved to Newcastle, Indiana, to take their first pastorate.

Brother and Sister Perry served as pastor in Newcastle, Greenfield, IN, Houston, TX, and at Anderson, Indiana, where they served as pastor for 21 years and built the Grace Holiness Church.

In November, 1986, Rev. Buddy Perry helped organize the *International Conservative Holiness Association*, and was elected as their first General Chairman. After nearly 32 years as Chairman of the ICHA he chose to resign in June, 2018.

"Their children shall rise up and call [them] blessed". (Proverbs 31:28). The children of Buddy and Jane Perry, Jeff, Jon, and Elizabeth offer this beautiful tribute to their parents. "One would be hard pressed to find someone more dependable or loyal than our Dad. He is just always there and has been a wonderful role model throughout the years. Dad is strong and steady, great at listening and always has just the right words of wisdom. He has never



wavered, even in the face of adversity. We haven't ever questioned his love and commitment to God, to our mother, or to any of his family. Dad is a hero in our eyes. And then there is our Mother. We are so blessed to have her! If there is such a thing as a biggest fan, she would fill that role for us. There is no one around with a bigger servant's heart. We count it an honor to have shared our parents through the years with the work they loved and believed in. It is a blessing to have had an amazing group of people who have spent the years loving and supporting our parents with us."
